



Alcohol Policy

Residents

- Residents of the Community shall be permitted to bring alcoholic beverages to the Clubhouse for social functions and to the Restaurant while dining at the Restaurant for their own personal consumption “Bring your own bottle (BYOB)”
- Residents are allowed to re-cork or cap bottles/containers of unfinished portions of their alcohol and take it home.
- Residents can collect or “pool” funds to purchase alcohol under the GOCA “BYOB” policy as long as they do not resale the alcohol.
- Alcoholic beverages may be served and consumed only within the confines of the Clubhouse and Restaurant facilities. The clubhouse and its amenity areas (including but not limited to the tennis, bocce, and golf course areas) are included in the license. No alcoholic beverages are allowed inside the fenced areas of the outdoor pool or in the indoor swimming pool area.
- Beverage consumption is prohibited by those who are visibly intoxicated, not of the legal age to consume alcoholic beverages, or otherwise violate of the regulations of this community or laws of the State of New Jersey.

Clubs & Committees

- Alcohol cannot be sold or included in the ticket price for a club or committee event unless a special one-day alcohol permit is obtained from the township. (Check current township regulations). Advance notice of the event as well as a copy of the special permit must be given to the Community Management Office prior to the event
- BYOB is permitted at club or committee events if permitted by the event organizers.
- Clubs, club members or committees are permitted to pool funds to bring in alcohol under the GOCA “BYOB” policy.
- A club may request to purchase alcohol from the GOCA such as bottled wine, beer, pitchers of blends like margaritas, or other beverage, etc., to be served by the GOCA bartender(s) during an event. The GOCA will sell in bulk at 10% over cost and place the opened bottles or beverage on tables for club. No sales can be for “packaged liquor” goods.
- Clubs and Committees can request that the bar be in operations during a club function when the restaurant is not in operation.
- On day when the bar is not open, a club or committee may request the bar be opened and will be responsible for the hourly cost for the bartender(s) and to directly pay a sum of fifty (\$50) per bartender to supplement the tips received from the attendees. An event is considered a 4 hour length. If more than 4 hours, the charge will be \$25/hour.
- If any event is exceeds 75 people a second bartender is required at additional cost of \$50/first 4 hours, regardless if the event is held during normal bar operating hours or a requested event outside of normal hours. If more than 4 hours, the charge will be \$25/hour.
- If a second bartender is requested and additional cost of \$50/first 4 hours. If more than 4 hours, the charge will be \$25/hour.
